### **Workshop evaluation results**

#### **Background:**

Ages & Stages: Communication development in the first 5 years workshop was conducted on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> August 2013 by Sarah Elphinstone, Speech Language Pathologist from Flourish Speech Pathology. #### Structure & Content of workshop:

The workshop was conducted for 2 hours. The content of the workshop included: What is communication? What is the difference between speech and language? Practice in identifying speech and language skills in children of different ages. Considerations of when and how to use checklists. All participants were provided with a disc of resources as well as a paper copy of the presentation.

#### Summary statement of results:


An overwhelming majority of participants were very pleased with the content and structure of the workshop. They found it to be value for money and would recommend the workshop to others.

A breakdown of the workshop evaluation results is presented below:

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


### Occupation of participants




Total number of participants was 22. When asked their occupation, one participant identified two occupational categories.

# Did you find the workshop interesting?




# How useful was the information presented?
